Remember, TRAACA will host the AACA 2022 Grand Nationals on Thursday – Saturday, May 19 – 21, 2022. The Founders Inn & Spa at 5641 Indian River Rd. in Virginia Beach will be the host hotel. The Delta Hotel off Greenbrier Parkway in Chesapeake will be the alternate hotel.

Many events are being planned for the 2022 Grand Nationals participants. There are tours planned for Thursday and Friday. 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# 34th Annual MOPAR Madness Car Show Saturday, November 6, 2021 Story and photos by Mark McAlpine

Autogroup hosted dueling car shows at its Chevrolet and Chrysler dealerships located on Western Branch Blvd in At the Hall Chrysler Dodge Jeep RAM Chesapeake. dealership, the Tidewater MOPAR Club (TMC) held its 34th Annual "MOPAR Madness" car show. Across the street, 757 Auto Events and Clearshine Virginia held a car show open to all makes, models, and years. (The car show at Hall Chevrolet was covered in the December 2021 issue of The Mudflap.) This was great for participants and spectators because you only had to cross the street to enjoy two car shows and see a diverse selection of nice cars and trucks. (When a car show is held at a dealership, I also like looking at the new cars and trucks for sale. Unfortunately, this year the dealerships' inventories were low because of the shortage of computer chips.)

The TMC's MOPAR Madness Car Show is always a great event (especially if you're a MOPAR fan). It usually has a nice selection of classic and modern vehicles from the Chrysler products lines (Chrysler, DeSoto, Dodge, Imperial, Jeep, Plymouth, RAM, etc.) especially muscle cars old and new. This year was no different—vehicles on display ranged from a 1951 Hudson Pacemaker convertible to modern Dodge Challengers and Chargers, Jeeps, and RAM pickup trucks.

Despite it being a brisk fall day (the high temperature that day was about a maximum of 58°F), turnout was good with

Participants and spectators were entertained throughout the day by popular local DJ Angela Brown, who played a variety of music popular across generations and happily accepted and played requests. Chick-fil-A was there in the morning offering breakfast sandwiches. Lunch was burgers and barbecue offered by J&K Style Grill's food truck. Gourmet cupcakes were available for dessert. (Ask Chris H for the name.)

The TRAACA was well represented at the car show. TRAACA members with cars on display included Riley Best with his 1964 Plymouth Valiant station wagon, Chris Hunt with her 1973 Plymouth Scamp, and Tony Scarpelli with his 1956 Chrysler New Yorker.

# *Still Collecting* -The Chauffeur *By Terry Bond*

In the earliest days of the automobile, the machinery was far more complex than many could handle. A lot of the wealthy owners of these playthings hired someone to help maintain, care for, and even operate them. Many mechanics in large agencies and garages hired out part-time to help earn some money of the side by helping others to enjoy the new "sport" of motoring. Often, it was a job that had no specific description other than to keep the darned thing going and looking good.



### An early automobile and a chauffeur.

Like the stable-hand that preceded in the age of the horse, the "chauffeur" was someone who had to be a "jack-of-alltrades." They were responsible for keeping brass polished, paintwork shining, upholstery clean, and of course keeping the automobile mechanically sound. That involved everything from changing tires (often a routine necessity) to repairing engines and anything connected to them.

Don't let those fancy chauffeur's uniforms deceive – there was plenty of grease under those finger-nails.

They were originally known as "motormen" but the name "chauffeur" quickly caught on. The term itself is derived from the French term meaning "stoker." For early steam powered vehicles, the stoker kept the boiler going and was generally responsible for maintaining the vehicle's operating system.

Many of the earliest chauffeurs were amateurs who could barely drive and had little experience other than some mechanical skills. The good ones quickly gained a reputation. The best of them had actual experience repairing early automobiles.

A 1906 article in the New York Times reported "The chauffeur problem to-day is one of the most serious that the automobilist has to deal with. Young men of no particular ability, who have been earning from \$10-12 a week, are

suddenly elevated to salaried positions paying from \$25-50 with great responsibility for expensive machines and the lives of their owners. Serious training is called for before becoming any kind of coach driver."



### Early chauffeurs were not always highly regarded professionals!

Chauffeurs began to join special "clubs" and associations – early versions of unions. Some of those organizations grew rapidly in larger cities and eventually expanded their reach to the state-wide level. They fought successfully for rules and regulations and were successful in gaining recognition for the better trained members of their organizations. To wear their badge often meant better pay and working conditions.

Eventually special training academies would spring up. Even mail-order courses could be purchased to better train chauffeurs. Cities and states began licensing chauffeurs. Some enterprising business-minded individuals formed companies to hire out drivers and mechanics.

The name "Chauffeur" has stuck and even today, chauffeur -driven limousines are commonplace, although a chauffeur employed as a hired-hand in an individual household is rare in modern times.

Ladies could be chauffeurs too! They were known as "chauffeuresses." Eventually though, those terms became synonymous with a variety of different names for those who drove automobiles. Automobilist, Motorist, and many other names were used to describe early motor vehicle operators or mechanics.

The first female "chauffeuresse" was Madame Decourcelle of Paris. She was licensed to operate a taxi in the city of Paris in 1904. Others preceded her in owning and driving automobiles, but she was the first licensed to transport others.

In a short time, being a paid chauffeur became an honored profession and a respected position in wealthy households. Much memorabilia survives today.

Old family photographs showing proud chauffeurs are a favorite of mine. Especially when a vehicle is included.

These images are often found on real photo type postcards in addition to family photo albums. It can be a challenge to identify the date, location and make of automobile though.

Many other images appear in prints and early lithographs. There is perhaps no more striking image than the Morgan and Wright tire company advertising poster shown here.

This print introduced their well-known advertising slogan "Wouldn't you rather ride on "good" tires?" The print dates from 1904 and the son of the company owner was used as the model for this "portrait" that was also known as "the little chauffeur." A similar image was used in many of their early advertisements. It's one of the prizes in my collection of motoring artwork.

A lot of prints depicting lady chauffeurs (at least ladies driving automobiles) exist, and they are among my favorite motoring related illustrations. Many of the artists were prolific illustrators, working for magazines. Their prints were often available by special order from the publisher, or appeared in volumes of their work. Unfortunately many of them have been cut from those bound volumes. Such prints are not rare and range in value from \$30-\$100 depending on size,

condition, and whether it was an individual print, or cut from a book (dis-bounded). Prints cut from magazines are least valuable as they are often overprinted with magazine titles and other information. There is also usually other advertising printed on the back-side that can sometimes be seen bleeding through to the cover image. These detract greatly from the image quality and impact value.

As you know, I am an enthusiastic collector of automobile related sheet music. The images on them are fabulous. I have far too many to frame and display, but they are all carefully archived in clear sleeves, alphabetically arranged in special cases. There are many early music sheets that depict ladies and automobiles, but not many that actually describe "the Lady Chauffeur." This has always been among my favorites, even though it is not a particularly rare item.

In my collection of automobile postcards, there are many images depicting chauffeurs. My favorites fall into the "humor" category.



Also in the "motoring humor" category is this great hardbound book called "Chauffeur Chaff." Note the term "automobilia" is also used! This little book is a compendium of humorous stores about chauffeur's operating automobiles. It is profusely illustrated with cartoons throughout. It was printed in 1905.

Here are a few other items that are chauffeur-related from my collection(s).

This large chauffeur driven town-car is not a particularly rare item, even though they were produced in the early 1900s. They also came as a bank and are sometimes used as a tobacco humidor. They came in two different sizes and coloring on them often varies. They were produced in Austria.

This great automobile mascot was originally produced in the late 1900s in France. It is bronze and is sometimes found silver or nickel plated. Be cautious however – cheap reproductions have recently been imported from overseas. They are in bronze finish and have been artificially aged. They are sold by an ebay vendor who advertises them as "...a style of..." in their description. To the untrained collector, it is difficult to tell they were made yesterday. Once they get into the secondary market, they are often

promoted as genuine old mascots. Look carefully at any potential acquisitions. The mounting stud is a good indication. Originals had a substantial mounting stud. There should be some indication that it has been held in place on an old radiator cap for a long time. Unused examples are simply not available at any price, so checking the base and mounting hardware should offer clues to age and actual usage.

Under the umbrella of "chauffeur" related automobillia, collectors have a wealth of objects to choose from. Chauffeur related artifacts are true cross-over collectibles that can fall into many different categories.

As they say on Tv - "But wait! There's more."

As I began to write it became obvious the topic was so broad that perhaps the article should be broken into at least two parts. So- next time we will continue looking at more chauffeur related items, including the popular collectible – Chauffeur's Badges.

We'll also take a look at some of the interesting clothing and uniforms worn by early chauffeurs. It's a big and fascinating topic.

I hope you have fun collecting in the coming year. The series continues as long as I have things to write about and an audience willing to learn more about the amazing world of automobilia.

Every year, the first Saturday of December is the day for the annual "Toys for Tots" charity car show and toy drive the show. TRAACA participants included Chris Hunt with in Smithfield, VA. This marks the 20th year that Elizabeth Moose has organized the show. (It should've been the 21st annual show, but the show was cancelled last year for circumstances outside Elizabeth's control. Perhaps you have heard about the COVID pandemic?) This was the fifth time the show has been held at the Smithfield Auto and Truck Center (the old Pomoco Ford dealership) on Church Street in Smithfield. The former dealership has a large showroom which is perfect for the many toys that companies and people generously donate to the cause. Also, the location on Church Street, which is one of the main streets entering Smithfield, gives the charity car show good exposure to the drive-by traffic.

The Smithfield Toys for Tots Car Show truly reflects small-town America. Santa, accompanied by Mrs. Claus, arrived by helicopter. The Smithfield Police blocked traffic while Santa was driven across the street in a wheeled wooden sleigh pulled by a small John Deere tractor.
