

# Still Collecting Stuff Horns!

Part of any good brass collection should be an assortment of early horns.

First word of caution is watch for cheap foreign madeyesterday reproductions. Type Brass Car Horn into your eBay search on any given day and you'll be looking at hundreds of cheap tinny, curly brass horns made in India, China, or Taiwan.

They are carefully aged in appearance and even the rubber

bulbs will be nicely deteriorated. They are usually advertised as "genuine" or "came from an old estate." Truth is, they were made yesterday.

The brass is thin and tinny. The joints between sections are crude and roughly finished. Mounting brackets are crude. Any soldering is poorly done. The rubber bulbs are just squeezed on. Often they are not marked as to brand, model number or country of origin.

Originals usually have a well known brand name well stamped on them. Such names as Standard, Rubes, American, and Non Pariel are the most common. European horns made by Lucas, P&H, Autovox and others can be found.

The real thing has substance to it. They are heavier, the brass is ticker and more substantial, the joints are nicely finished with collars, solder

joints are well done, brackets are solid and well attached, and even the rubber bulbs have solid mounts. Once you handle the real thing, you'll never have any more questions.

Horns are described by the number of "twists" in them.



This refers to the number of "turns" the brass tubing takes. Except for some very early horns, the bells will be covered with a fine brass mesh "bug screen."

Most horns used brass flexible tubing to connect to the bulb. Both bulbs and tubing

can be purchased from Model T parts suppliers. Beware of fake "snake head" or Boa Constrictor horns.

Once you see the real thing you'll instantly recognize the junk. Here a few interesting horns to look at, and if you have

questions or contemplate a purchase, I'm available to advise anytime. Happy collecting (Toot-Toot)!

# Still Horsing Around in Her First Car

Fifty years ago; on April 17, 1964; the Mustang debuted and it is reported that on the first day 22,000 units were sold. This far proceeded the original forecast by Ford. As I was still in high school at that time; I did not get in on the original sales but I did get my 1964  $\frac{1}{2}$  (dubbed that because it was launched at an unusual halfway point during the season )when I got my first full time job with the Government and was able to save up the amount of the purchase.

Subsequent to this; I had many adventures and many misadventures with my "Pony". I have had the car repainted once; motor overhauled at 100 miles; I myself reupholstered the seats and reinstalled a dash board after someone seemed to need it and the rally pack from the steering column. Donald and my Father kept the mechanical end of it going with a few alterations like a larger fan blade for summer due to the limited air flow ( and of course no AC ).

Since I began to show my Mustang; I have taken several awards with it including one Best in Show and a number of second place awards. The 1964 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> has been difficult to judge because of the nature of it's progression through the line; at first remaining Falcon parts were used to complete them and that made each one unique. Some have Falcon vents; some have Falcon radiators and there has always been a discussion about Alternator vs Generator.

The emblems on the 64  $\frac{1}{2}$  is shorter than that of the 65. Some 64  $\frac{1}{2}$  models have a solid chrome piece around each windshield wiper hinge and some have a gap between the top of the hinges and the base. The door lock buttons on the 64  $\frac{1}{2}$ were color keyed to the interior and the 65 were chrome. The dramatic styling was very unusual for it's day and appeared to European; particularly in the front end.

That is what attracted me to my Mustang and the history of it is the reason that I still have my first car that I ever owned.



# Winter Blast to Gloucester!

Sunday, March 23, 2014, 9:30 AM. Destination: Yorktown -Gloucester, The Watermen's Museum. Forecast: Some sun with maybe afternoon rain, maybe sleet, maybe more? Are we sure it's Spring? That sure didn't stop Mickey and Tony McChesney from bringing their 1984 Olds Delta 88 2 door, or the Milligan's, Dewey and Maxine, as well as Wayne and Carol riding up from Chesapeake in their 1953 Ford Sedan. Tony and Leslie Scarpelli brought their 1962 Imperial Convertible and Jim and Betty Villers arrived in their 1967 230SL Mercedes Convertible. Bob and Dot Parrish drove their 1978 T-Bird, and Alfonzo Ludovici and Patrizia LoBetti in their 1956 DeSoto Fireflite Sportsman. Keith Colonna made the journey in his 1956 Continental MK II. Dana Meadows joined us for lunch in his 1957 Thunderbird. Bob Stein showed off his latest acquisition, a 1987 Jaguar V12 XJ-SC Cabriolet. Ken and Barbara Talley rode in Julie Hobbs' SUV, and Jere and Carol Avenson brought one as well. Neil and Marty Sugermeyer with their dog Johnnie, drove modern, as did Bill Wilcox and passenger Melanie Kordis



Our hosts at the museum, open just for us, were Steve and Diane Ormsby. We had a history lesion about the importance of Yorktown in Colonial Days, and an inside-out special tour of a beautifully recreated wind-powered grist mill. Inside the museum buildings, initially situated across the river, an guided tour followed with information about Watermen and models of the many varieties of shallow draft boats designed specifically for making a living on or near the water.

The Chesapeake Bay and England are the only locations in the world where the term Watermen is applied to those who



make their living from oysters, crabs, fish, and clams. The museum also helps kids learn about and build boats as fund raisers. They have fun activities, one of which is Pirate Day Camp which caught Bob Stein's interest.

Late morning found us parking all of the antique cars on the brick walk near the Waterside Grille where we were seated in the heated patio room on the river for lunch. Interesting menu, ever tried deep fried avocado, or made your own Bloody Mary at a Bar? Then north a short ride north across the York River to the Abingdon Episcopal Church where again Steve and Diane Ormsby were present.

They opened the 250 year old Flemish Bond brick building, designed in the form of a Latin Cross. It is the largest colonial church in Virginia with a beautiful Pipe Organ, recently made in England, and multilevel pulpit.



Neil played a hymn for us on their Steinway Piano. Our hosts were also very knowledgeable about the history of the church. Exploring their burial grounds will have to wait for a warmer day. North again on Route 17 brought us into Gloucester Courthouse. We will also have to explore that history on another trip.

A right turn onto VA 14 toward Matthews brought us to Holly Hill Farm Antiques. Multiple buildings with lots of "Stuff" and surprise, Sam Kern was already there, exploring the old tools building. Getting ahead of our antique collecting members is tough!

By mid afternoon we found TC Walker Elementary School for When Peace Again Shall Smile, performed by The Courthouse Players, some of whom we had just met on St Patrick's Day. This play was based on historical letters between local





Confederate soldiers and their Gloucester Taliaferro family members during the War Between the States. The letters, and how they were performed, brought us a feeling of what happened 150 years ago. Music from the period brought meaning to a song of an severely injured double amputee who could not walk away from the hospital. He could not afford morphine at 25 cents, but maybe could buy beer for a nickel.

Later in the afternoon, limited sunshine which had been evident early in the day, became a drizzly cold rain as we traveled to nearby Goodfellas for supper.

Traveling home to Tidewater with surprisingly little traffic, we'll remember that good friends, good stories, and especially plenty of food, make a TRAACA day trip a fun adventure.

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







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
