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San Diego Automotive Museum—Pt 1 San Diego, CA

While participating in the 2019 Western Fall Nationals automobiles—that still stands. In 1952, Mr. Mattar and in Fallbrook, CA, Marion & I arrived a few days early in order to enjoy some of the tours the host region (the Fallbrook Vintage Car Club) had organized and to do some exploring on our own. On the Wednesday before the show, Marion & I visited San Diego's historic Balboa Park. Balboa Park was the location for two world fairs (1915-1916 and 1935-1936), and many of the original buildings remain, repurposed but with their original facades preserved and restored. Some of the buildings look a little run down, but at least they have been preserved for history and for residents of San Diego and visitors to enjoy. One building was renovated and is now used as a gymnasium, another is an events hall (and a popular location for weddings), one is an aviation museum, and one—the former Conference Building—is home to the San Diego Automotive Museum. According to its website, the museum was the idea of renown automobile racer and collector Briggs Cunningham and opened in December 1988.

The museum has a permanent collection of antique and classic automobiles and a small automotive library. It also features special long-term exhibitions and temporary "spotlight exhibitions" focusing on special vehicles and different eras of popular automotive cultures. When we visited the museum, it had four special exhibitions: International Motorcycles with one of the best selections of British motorcycles that I've seen (and on exhibit until May 2024), Indian Motorcycles (on exhibit until February 2024), Louis Mattar's "Fabulous \$75,000 Car" (a 1947 Cadillac that set the world non-stop endurance record for

two other men took turns driving in 5-hour shifts, covering 6,320 miles coast-to-coast roundtrip by towing a custom trailer that held 230 gallons of gasoline, 15 gallons of oil, and 30 gallons of water (and a shower, drinking fountain, and "mobile" telephone), and which was refueled en route at three airfields by a moving fuel truck. The car and trailer had hydraulic jacks that allowed their tires to be changed while the car was moving. The car took 7 years to build at a cost of \$75,000—hence its name.

The museum also had a special display of "lowrider" cars, pedal cars, bicycles, and one motorcycle. While lowriders may not be to the taste of most AACA members, the craftmanship and artistry of these specially selected vehicles was fantastic. One vehicle in particular—a 1959 Chevrolet Impala—was incredible: besides having custom paint so deep and glossy that it looked like you could dip your hand in it, the engine compartment and undercarriage were fully chromed with every inch embellished with beautiful jewelry-like engraving on it. The exterior was highlighted with etched chrome bumper guards & mirrors.

If you every visit San Diego, take the time to explore Balboa Park. The automotive museum is outstanding, but there's much more to explore. Visit the world-famous San Diego Zoo. Tour the Air & Space Museum with over 60 aircraft on display (including an A-12 spy plane—the predecessor to the SR-71—in front of the museum) or one of the other 16 museums. Walk through the 19 public gardens. Catch a concert or play, view artists at work in the Spanish Village Art Studio, take dance lessons, etc.but go to the car museum first.



Still Collecting At the dinner table

It's dinner time! While sitting here enjoying the evening meal, and contemplating my next collecting article, it occurred to me while looking at a salt and pepper set, that the dinner table has long been a place where early automobilia was likely to appear (and be used) in the household.

As I've noted many times, if you were well-off enough to own an automobile in the early 1900s, you were inclined to show-off a bit. What better place that at the dinner table surrounded with envious guests.

From table-ware like fancy plates and cups, to napkin rings, service pieces and even hand-painted wine glasses, there are items of automobilia just waiting for the serious collector.

I've previously written about this wonderful pitcher and tumbler set from Dresden, Germany, acquired by chance in an Ohio antique mall. It would have been a wonderful serving set for the dinner table.

Those wonderful Royal Doulton plates were not sold as a dinner service but no doubt saw some use in roadside pubs in the early 1900s, where motorists would stop for their dinner. It was a sure sign that travelling motorists would be welcome. The large

platters especially, are very difficult to find, as are the large serving bowls.

Large sized Royal Doulton pitcher. These range in size from 5 ¼" to over 7 ½" tall. Be fussy about condition when contemplating a purchase as most have chips around the lip. Some have had broken handles that have been repaired. With any of the Doulton pieces, significant crazing in the glaze detracts greatly from their val-

They are referred to as milk, chocolate, or water pictures.

One of my favorite serving pieces is this wonderful Austrian produced tea pitcher that depicts a lady motorist, dressed for a trip in an early car, carrying a jug of "Benzin" (Gasoline). Her head removes to fill the pitcher, and her scarf flows back to form the handle. Tea (or other refreshing beverages) are poured from the spout on the "gasoline" jug she is carrying. It was made in 1908.

These great pieces are quite delicate, but they do survive in sufficient quantity you should be able to add one to your collection with some diligent searching and patience. Her colored dress under the motoring coat comes in a variety of colors including pink, brown, green, and a pale yellow.

There are still other serving pieces including a wide range of platters, bowls, and plates with motoring scenes on them. Not all plates were intended to be used at the dinner table though. Some were intended only for display – known as "rack-plates" because they were intended to display in a home on special plate racks. Some had special hangers made into them when produced. On most, two small holes were made in the bottom "rim" so a string could be threaded through to hang the plate from a nail on the wall. With any of these serving platters, bowls, or plates,

scratching on the image from actual usage will reduce their value.



There are many other serving pieces that are decorated with motoring images but be cautious as many modern collectibles were produced from the 1950s on. It can be difficult to tell at first glance so watch for a future article on how to tell the new from the old. The photo below shows a sampling of commonly found modern china cups. Matching plates, platters, and other serving pieces are readily available for these items. Although they are of decent quality, the images are totally screen-printed, rather than having hand applied coloring to a transfer (decal) print. Additionally, they have the name and year of the car clearly marked.



Condiment sets for the dinner table come in many different shapes and styles. Some were made entirely of glass. Others were made from brass or silver. These held cut-glass salt and pepper shakers and mustard or other containers. For breakfast, silver automobile toast-racks were used.

One of the most difficult items to find for automobilia collectors is a napkin ring. Rolled napkins, held with silver "rings" embossed with motoring images are considered "holy grail" among napkin ring collectors, and premium prices are often paid for them – well beyond what we would consider spending as mere accumulators of early motoring relics.

The late Bill Gottschalk, often considered as a mentor when I first became interested in automobilia, had collected these along with his enthusiastic wife Lillian. After Bills passing in the early 1980s, Lillian published an entire book documenting her amazing collection of antique napkin rings. There were fewer than a half dozen automobile related among the hundreds pictured.





Salt and pepper shakers themselves are highly sought after but very rare. As you could imagine, pairs were often separated, and the corrosive effect of salt helped spell the demise of many a great piece over the years. Some more modern salt and pepper shaker sets have been produced in the shapes of automobiles, but here are a couple of very rare items that exist in other collections. First up- from 1915, these souvenir Indianapolis 500 salt and pepper shakers sold at auction several years ago for nearly \$3,000.00.



Produced in silvered ceramic, this little salt and pepper set is from the 1930s and was made in Japan. It's cute, and affordable.



The silver salt and pepper shaker set depicting appropriately attired early motorists is one that turns up occasionally. These were produced by Chester England silversmiths Saunders and Shephard in 1908 and are known as "Mr. Popple" after the character in a much-loved British musical production – "Mr. Popple of Ippleton." These were originally made in 1908 and came in a velvet lined, fitted, leather covered They are appropriately hallmarked and the name of the company that produced them is clearly marked on their base. They were reproduced in 1993 however by the Whitehill Silver & Plate Company and are so marked. There is of course a vast difference in value between the original 1908 item and the 1993 reproduction. Still, either would look great displayed in a showcase (or on the dinner table).

One of my favorite, but newer items in this category is the wonderful 1950s plastic Model T with driver and passenger, which are removable and are the salt and pepper shakers. This was a recent Christmas gift and still has its original box.

In the drinking glass category, hand painted wine glasses, engraved tankards, or beautifully hand decorated glassware is highly collected, but extremely rare. The wine glass shown below is handpainted and part of a set of six. The images show race cars. Their origin and the significance of the cars remains unknown.

Of course no great meal comes to an end without desert. This fantastic silver and glass automobile is a rolling candy dish that no doubt once graced the table of a wealthy motorist. It is the only one like it known and was sold at an auction in Germany several years ago for an undisclosed amount.

Luray Virginia Pre-War Swap Meet Story and photos by Terry Bond

Last October when Hershey was cancelled, the also cancelled Pre-War swap meet out in Luray, Virginia was quickly rescheduled to fill the void left that month. Yes-plenty of folks were hungry for a good old fashioned swap meet and that "mini-Hershey" was a big success.

It's usually held in May, so the date was circled on the calendar for 2021 in hopes things would return to at least near-normal. I made hotel reservations at the historic MImslyn Inn on the hill downtown.

With the diminishing threat of the virus and having received the requisite doses of "freedom juice" I eagerly packed the truck with my "fleas" and prepared for a great weekend.

Then-a stupid "fuel crisis" worsened by usual media sensationalism set in and caused a momentary hiccup. My truck was already full, and reports that plenty of gas was available around Luray were all it took to get me on the way.

Gas – not a problem. I topped up the other side of Richmond and had plenty left when I arrived.



Thursday, I went straight to the field at the VFW club on Rt 211 and set up my awning and tables, then joined the gang from Richmond for a wonderful Italian dinner.

Friday morning I arrived at 7:30 AM and the public parking areas were already nearly full. The line of vendors coming in to set up stretched to a dozen deep. With perfect weather and a field full of both eager buyers and sellers it was going to be a great weekend.



Vendors at Luray are for the most part strictly hobbyists. Trucks and trailer loads of early Model T, A, and other parts are fresh out of the barns, from under the work benches, or the fields surrounding the mountains. Most of it was unsorted, and still greasy and "as-found." Model T parts of all kinds where there. Engines, complete chassis, even complete cars could be bought reasonably. Sellers came to sell. Buyers came to buy.



One vendor had bought a whole barn full of parts while on the way to Luray. He had negotiated the purchase a few days earlier and picked everything up en-route to the swap meet. He stayed up all night Thursday sorting through things and pricing it all. Much was unidentified and all was priced to sell. Such fun poking through boxes of unsorted antique car parts from the early teens and twenties!



There were a reported 67 vendors present. A few decided not to chance getting stuck without gas, but it still was the largest and best attended swap meet they've held there.

Club members from the local Model T Club, and VFW members were friendly and eager to help make it a great weekend, whether it was helping vendors find their spot, or slinging hamburgers. Friday evening, there was even a free Fried Chicken dinner for vendors courtesy of the VFW.
