Dalton and Carroll Williford are some of our newest members and we would like to introduce them to you.

His first memory of cars was a 1957 Pontiac, Star Chief belonging to his parents. In 1964 his dad bought a 1963 Grand Prix, which he kept until Dalton could drive. His love of Pontiacs was always a part of him. It was evident in a paper he wrote in school



describing his dream car, a 1967 convertible, 4 speed GTO. He was 12 when he wrote it in 1968.

Through the 70's Dalton had a 1966 GTO and several Grand Prix's.

During the 80's Dalton started his detached garage business.

In 1987 Dalton bought and restored a 1972 Pontiac Trans Am, and also bought a 1987 IROC with a Corvette motor. He took it to Bowling Green, Ky to drag race. Soon, he fell in love with the Grand National Buick because it was so fast. See how "infectious" this car thing can be?

While he was there a video was taken of Dalton racing his IROC against a T Type Grand National. The video has recently surfaced on IG. They didn't know until family and friends started to see it.

In January, 1988 he traded the IROC for a 1987 Grand National. He drag raced the car regularly for 8 years, eventually retiring it as a race car in 1996 with over 2,000 passes down the dragstrip. It would later become a show car.

Carroll & Dalton's Car Journey

The GN was replaced as a drag car by the 1970 GTO. Both Carroll and Dalton enjoyed race weekends at the track.

July 2003 they bought a red convertible Corvette.

2008 they bought a Z06 blue Corvette.

They started going to Barrett Jackson in Las Vegas.

The second time in Vegas they bought a 1966 convertible 442.

2015 Dalton bought his dream car, a 1967 GTO at Mecum Auction in Harrisburg, PA. He went to Massachusetts to buy the correct motor for the GTO. On the way back, Dalton bought Carroll her first show car, a 2017 Pontiac Grand Sport convertible, white with a red interior.



He had the 1967 GTO restored and has shown it regularly, most recently at the AACA Nationals in Hampton this past summer where it received an AACA Senior.

The Grand National was replaced by a 1970 GTO drag car. Many nice weekends were enjoyed by both. It's hard to describe the thrill of racing in a car like this, but this photo showing the front wheels off the ground gives you some idea of the tremendous power it has. Of course it's not the family grocery-getter, but if ever needed for that, it'll be a quick trip to the store!



In 2017 they went to the Barrett Jackson Auction and discovered the fast Dodge Demon. Carroll searched for one for sale and found an allocation for one to be built on E-Bay. They had car #1248 of 3,000 built. The Demon became a race car and show car, winning many awards. In 2023 the Demon was reintroduced by Dodge, it was bought with the matching VIN to the 2018 Demon.

Each Demon has been willed to the 2 grand-daughters, Olivia and Charlotte. They are now the new car lovers of the family.

This journey has satisfied Dalton's "Need for Speed".
















From the AACA Rummage Box:

A "WHALE" OF A DISCOVERY was found in the Martin Marietta Carmel Church Quarry in 1990. The first bones found included neck vertebrae dating from 14 million years ago and were excavated in 1991-2. More than 50% of the skeleton was recovered, making it one of the most complete fossilized whales discovered in the Eastern United States. The whale was identified as a new species from that period, based on the difference in ear bones. The Latin name is Eobaleenoptera Harrisoni, recorded in 2004. https://co.caroline.va.us/328/Whale-Display

Virginia Museum of History and Culture was founded in 1831 as the Virginia Historical Society. It is the oldest curated collection in Virginia, totaling more than nine million items. Taking pride of place in the lobby is a fully restored 1918 model Kline car, the only automobile ever manufactured in Richmond. Featured during this visit is a special exhibition celebrating the first Lego Factory in the United States. There are more than 100 models of iconic land, air, sea, and space vehicles constructed from nearly one million LEGO® bricks. After viewing the exhibition guests can get creative with thousands of LEGO® bricks to build anything they can imagine. \$5 Parking by Credit Card at Gate.

Lewis Ginter Botanical Gardens was named for the Tobacco Baron that helped rebuild Richmond after the Civil War. This year, 2024 marks the 200th anniversary of his birth, and the fortieth anniversary of the gardens dedicated to his memory by his niece. The two had traveled to Australia in 1890 for the international commercial exhibition of his tobacco products. They toured the public gardens in Sydney and Melbourne. Grace Arents left money and the land in her will as a tribute to him, and their trip Down Under.



Monday, On we also enjoyed more winding country roads through the mountains, and a visit to the Ghost Town Museum in Colorado Springs. Old building facades had been reassembled






a former railroad workshop to create a fully furnished 1800s town. There was a fully stocked general store, blacksmith shop, saloon, and many other businesses lining a street with

smoke from California wildfires, and we found ourselves getting tired easily. It's good to be back home at sea-level once again.





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
