



TRAACA Tour of Fort Monroe

TRAACA members met in Ocean View, Norfolk, before heading to the Peninsula for a tour of historic Fort Monroe. Those participating included Matt and Vickie Doscher in their 1965 Mercury Caliente, Al Becker in his 1929 Packard, Ron Huibers and his son Scott in Ron's 1968 Volvo 1800S, Dana and Debbie Meadows in their 1966 Triumph TR4A, Fred Cole in his 1984 Buick, Travis and Kim Berry, Jerry and Ellen Adams and their daughters, and Wayne and Carol Milligan all driving modern. At Fort Monroe, we were met by our guide, Park Ranger Vickie, who led us on a 45-minute walking tour of the fort's grounds, highlighting several of the original buildings, the moat, the lighthouse, the casemates, and the spectacular views including Fort Wool across the channel.

Per Wikipedia, Fort Monroe was constructed between 1819-1834; however, as early as 1608, Captain John Smith recognized the importance of building a fort at Point Comfort, as early English colonists called the area. The initial fort was a wooden stockade known as Fort Algernourne. The more substantial stone structure (known as Fort Monroe in honor of President James Monroe) and Fort Wool, on an artificial island across the channel, were completed in 1834. These forts guarded the navigation channel between the Chesapeake Bay and Hampton Roads. Surrounded by a moat, Fort Monroe is the largest

stone fort ever built in the United States. Throughout the Civil War it remained a Union installation, and became a symbolic site of early freedom for former slaves under the "contrabands of war" policies. After the war, Confederate President Jefferson Davis was imprisoned within the fort and its casemate for two years. The fort is now decommissioned as a military installation and is managed by the National Park Service and the City of Hampton.

Following our tour, the group entered the Casemate Museum and toured the facility at our own pace. The museum presents the fort through its many years as an active military installation. It also includes the cell used to house Jefferson Davis, depicted as it was throughout his incarceration. Our Club Board previously approved making a donation to the museum, and a check for \$100.00 was presented. After our tour of the Casemate Museum, the TRAACA group made its way to The Deadrise restaurant for an excellent lunch.

The tour of Fort Monroe was very informative, the weather was ideal, and the Museum was gracious and offered an interesting collection and representation of the history of the fort. Lunch was tasty, reasonably priced, and timely with a pleasant staff. We had 16 participants, with 5 antique automobiles, who enjoyed a pleasant Saturday morning tour and lunch.

On September 30, 2017, the Southeast Virginia Street Rod (and muscle car) Association (SVSRA) hosted its 25th Annual Charity Car Show. For the past five years the SVSRA car show has been held at the Daniels Performance Group facility in Smithfield, VA, owned by fellow TRAACA member Charlie Daniels.

The SVSRA annual car show is different from other local car and charity shows in several respects. There are no trophies for the vehicles, but there are trophies for the children & adults participating in races involving tricycles. (We had Hot Wheels cars donated by one of the SVSRA members for the prizes.) Every participant who registered a vehicle went home with a door prize & dash plaque, and had the opportunity to win a raffle for a 4-camera wireless security system or a wheeled cart full of tools, and a 50/50 raffle. Fellow TRAACA member Toni McChesney won the 50/50 Raffle and donated some of her winnings back to the charity. *Thank You* for the donation, Toni!

The best part about this charity show is that the proceeds from the show benefit one-to-two local charities every year. Since 1993 the SVSRA club has donated almost \$80,000.00 to various charities in the Hampton Roads area. This year two charities will receive the proceeds from the show: the Horton Wreath Society, whose volunteers purchase & place wreaths on veterans'

graves at the Suffolk Veterans Memorial Cemetery every December, and the Honor Flight of Triangle Virginia, which is a group of volunteers that transport WWII, Korean War, and Vietnam War veterans to visit their appropriate war memorials in Washington, DC, at no cost to the veterans.

We had a beautiful day for the car show, without worries of rain. There were a few flea market vendors selling their goods, and our DJ—Angela Brown—played a great selection of music. And a big *Thank You* to Angela, who generously donated her DJ salary back to the charity!

A number of TRAACA members attended the show, either volunteering in some capacity as SVSRA members or helping raise money for the charities by registering their vehicles. TRAACA members present included: Charlie Daniels & Chris Hunt (who brought her 1973 Plymouth Scamp), Mark & Marion McAlpine (and their 1970 Chevelle SS), Mickey & Toni McChesney (and their 1984 Olds Delta 88), Tom & Roe Poe (and their 1963 Studebaker Lark), and Bill & Linda Treadwell (and their 1969 Camaro). It was another great year for Hershey, with about 1,265 vehicles registered for the meet. The AACA Eastern Fall Meet was held October 3-7, 2017, in Hershey, PA. The weather was actually not bad, it was dry and warm with highs in the low 80s. This was unusual weather for Hershey in October. It is more often like last year when we had to judge those beautiful cars while it was drizzling and chilly.

This year, Mark & I ventured up to Hershey on Tuesday hoping to see more of the swap meet. Unfortunately, or fortunately depending on how you look at it, we did not get over to the swap meet any more than in the past. We did get into the town of Harrisburg, PA, and visited two museums: the Pennsylvania National Fire Museum and the National Civil War Museum. Both are well worth checking out. The National Civil War Museum sits atop a large hill overlooking the city of Harrisburg, PA. We made it to the AACA Museum for the Cars and Coffee on Thursday morning, held in the garage down behind the museum. There are always some interesting and unusual vehicles in the garage. There was a special display in the museum celebrating the 50th Anniversary of the birth of the Chevrolet Camaro & the Pontiac Firebird.

Also on Thursday, Mark & I helped out at the AACA Library Tent in Chocolate Field. This year the AACA Library Bookmobile was on display. It was fun to talk to people about the benefits the AACA Library has to offer AACA members and to let them know about how the Bookmobile will be used in future AACA National Meets.

After working the AACA Library Tent, Mark and I proceeded over to the car corral surrounding the swap meet. There were some very nice vehicles in the car corral. There were probably more cars earlier in the day, but by the afternoon rain was moving in and some vehicles had departed. In fact, because of the rain, many vendors and shoppers were trying to get off the field. We decided it would take a long time to get off the field, so we walked over to Chocolate World to buy some chocolate. We stayed there to eat dinner and then wandered over to the Hershey Music Box Theatre where they were showing some old black & white movies.

Friday was a busy day, starting with viewing the AACA Race Car Condition Runs over at the Hershey Stadium in Red Field with Kim & Travis Berry, Vickie & Matt Doscher, and Carol & Wayne Milligan. Although the cars being evaluated were loud, (they were race cars), it was really fun to observe the process the vehicles go through before letting them onto the show field for judging. We will certainly go back to see the evaluation again.

We had to hoof it from the Hershey Stadium to the

Green Field to volunteer at the AACA Membership Tent. We stayed very busy signing up new members or renewing current members. We always enjoy visiting with prospective and current members. We were able to sign up several military veterans for the AACA's free military sponsorship program, and hopefully they will all renew in 2019.

Next on our Friday agenda was the AACA National Judging School, followed by teaching our Continuing Judges Education (CJE) courses. Getting out of Hershey Park afterward was a bit challenging because the traffic leaving the swap meet gets channeled into one lane before leaving the park. Fortunately, meeting up with good friends for dinner made up for the traffic.

Saturday, of course, was the big show. Most of the 1,265 antique vehicles registered appeared to be there. As usual, there were many beautiful vehicles from every era on the show field. After we judged, Mark & I spent another couple of hours taking photos and talking to participants. We finished the day at a favorite family-owned restaurant near the hotel with several TRAACA and Richmond Region friends.

This year there was another great showing of TRAACA members at Hershey—by our count, at least 50 people attended. TRAACA members who brought vehicles to the meet included Scott Davies, Jim Elliott, Tim Hund, Dick McIninch, Reggie Nash, Wes Neal, and Bill Treadwell. The more we do at Hershey, the more we seem to enjoy it. We're looking forward to next year!





There is also a rare pin for a Pennsy Motors Company automobile made only a short time in Pennsylvania.

Within another few minutes I found two fabulous bronze paperweights. These wonderful pieces are made of heavy




A rare Pennsy Motors Co. advertising pin

Taking photos from the scooter is just not easily done. For me, it has taken at least two extra hands to do most things and a long time to travel 10 yards on my own with the walker. So, Hershey wasn’t easy. Still, it was the promise of goodies around the corner that kept me going.



Dinners out with friends, just sitting to talk and visit, was what made my Hershey great this year. One other important discovery this year is the handicapped-accessible portable toilet. It’s **BIG &** served as a separate walk-in closet in which we could store things overnight. For the extra money involved, I think we’ll do that again next year. Otherwise our plan is to put the walker back in the attic, let someone else rent the scooter, and return to normal operation.

I hope your Hershey experience was great and that your collection continues to grow.






