# Oldsmobile Club of America National Meet Dayton, OH Story and photos by Mark McAlpine

AACA Nationals are nice because you get to see antique vehicles from many manufacturers including some that no longer exist (and, in some cases, that you may not have even heard of before). The disadvantage is you usually only get to see a limited number of vehicles from each marque. Attending a specific marque's national car show is nice because you'll see a broad selection of models and years from across the manufacturer's history. Such was the case for the 2023 Oldsmobile Club of America (OCA) National Meet held in Dayton, OH, on 9-12 August 2023.

Over 300 vehicles were displayed at the 2023 OCA National Meet, ranging from a 1904 curved-dash Oldsmobile (displayed by its second owners!) to a 2004 Silhouette minivan. Oldsmobiles of any vintage are eligible to participate in OCA National Meets, which means—because Oldsmobile ceased production in 2004—vehicles only 19 years old were able to be shown in 2023. (I have to admit that it was strange to see a curved-dash Olds and a Silhouette minivan on the same show field. Of course, it's strange to see any minivan entered in a classic car show. Then again, it's impressive to see any 20-year-old car in like-new condition.)

For muscle car fans, the 2023 Olds National Meet was a great show. Muscle cars were well-represented on the show field. Oldsmobile was known for high-performance vehicles, most notably its famous Rocket 88 engine in 1949-1953 and then Cutlass 442s and Hurst/Olds of the 1960s and 1970s. By my count, there were over 75 Hurst/Olds, 442s (some from the 1980s) and Cutlass W-31s, W-32s, Rallye 350s, and Ram

Rod 350s on the show field, not mention a number of 1949-1953 Rocket 88s and at least five 1962-1963 F-85 Jetfires equipped with 215-ci turbo-charged V8 engines.

One thing that surprised me was the dearth of pre-war cars on the show field. However, the few pre-war cars that were there were impressive, most notably the unrestored 1930 Oldsmobile Model F30 Super Deluxe Sport Coupe. The 1940 Series 70 Touring Sedan and 1940 Series 90 Sport Coupe were amazing because both had been repainted over 40 years ago (the Series 70 by the owner when he was in high school).

Over half of the cars were from the 1960s and 1970s. While most of these were Cutlasses/F-85s (probably because of the number produced and the availability of reproduction parts), full-size cars were out in force, too, with plenty of Delta 88s (mostly convertibles), Starfires, Toronados, and a few 98s on the field. Each was beautiful in its own way.

One neat event I wish we could've gone to was the Oldsmobile Club National Drag Race held on Thursday, 10 August. Whether you had a fully stock street car or a minorly or majorly modified car, there was a race class for you. It must've been a blast to be transported back in time and see these classic cars racing each other down the drag strip.

So, if you're a fan of a specific automotive marque, track down where the respective national clubs are holding their regional or national meets. Chances are one is being held within a reasonable driving distance of you.

Still, there are occasional opportunities to wander, and always, there are a few goodies just around the corner. This beautiful early automobile club badge was a chance find.

That evening we enjoyed another outdoor dinner at a newly discovered pub – Copper Kettle. Several brasscar friends from New York joined us for a long evening of great food, cold beer and stories about old cars.

Wednesday was another day for a great discovery. My plan was to spend time wandering in the Chocolate field until around noon. It did not take me

long to find a vendor with a table full of brass who was just unpacking some artwork from his personal collection. I snagged this wonderful piece as quick as I could!

It's known as "the Mad Motorist" and is a watercolor of an early motorist at speed, his fur coat blowing in the breeze as he grips the steering wheel. His eyes are full of the excitement of early motoring. No doubt it at one time graced the wall of a motoring enthusiast who was not timid in showing the daring and excitement the early drivers were recognized for.

Not wanting to carry in around, I quickly returned to my spaces. I spent the afternoon showing it off and enjoying the ooohs and ahhhs from fellow collectors of motoring artwork.

Wednesday evening was our traditional Italian dinner at Feniccis in Hershey. This wonderful restaurant has been a Hershey landmark for many years. We were with a group from New York and when walking in, stopped to say hi to the rest of the Tidewater Region members who were already there.

After dinner, I added another great item to my collection – this time something actually useful! I've been searching for a good Model T Coil tester for years. They are usually expensive, or in such poor unoriginal condition they are useless.

The unit is quite heavy and consists of a complete Model T Ford flywheel/magneto assembly with a cranking mechanism attached. It includes a large Amp and meter. It can be used to adjust Model T Ford ignition coils and test spark plugs. Because of the weight, transferring it directly from one vehicle to another seemed easier than trying to haul it through the flea market.

The price difference can be vast!

# "America's Automotive Library" Identifies its Oldest Artifacts By Steve Rossi VP - Public Relations & Event Planning



The Chris & Kathleen Koch AACA Library & Research Center has identified its oldest antique automotive artifact. It is a copy of A Handbook for Steam Users Being Rules for Engine Drivers and Boiler Attendants by M. Powis Bale, from 1890. In addition, a February 14, 1891, issue of Scientific American features an analysis of the 3wheeled Butler Petrol-Cycle from Great Britain. According to Library Director Jen Wolfe, "Since automotive history is an inexact science, trying to pinpoint the first piece of automotive material ever published is impossible...though Duryea is credited with producing the first American automobile in series by 1896." Some believe that Panhard began producing promotional literature... in color... during 1892 (from Panhard & Levassor: Pioneers in Automobile Excellence, by David Beare), which the AACA artifacts predate. The Smithsonian's Smith Hempstone Oliver contended that the first automotive catalog appeared in 1888/1889, from Philadelphia's Moto-Cycle Manufacturing Company. It featured Lucius D. Copeland-designed steam cycles and steam carriages. (The Bulb Horn, May-June 1966) Either way, as a function of the publication timeline above, "America's Automotive Library" is at the forefront. The AACA Library & Research Center was established in 1977 and houses over 3 million individual automotive artifacts at its Hershey, PA headquarters. It is the largest and most comprehensive institution of its kind. In addition, the Library also oversees nine singlemarque collections within its climate controlled, secure and professionally managed facility, which includes a state of the art fire suppression system. The library is open and free to the public during normal hours of operation. On-site research is free to anyone who visits. AACA Members receive 2 hours of free offsite research per calendar year to be used within the calendar year. Additional research, photocopies, scans and reproductions are available for a fee. Donations such as literature, books, artwork, manuals, periodicals, toys/models, etc. are welcomed and encouraged. Upon receipt of materials, the Library will provide the donor with a letter acknowledging the gift. Visit the library website at https://aacalibrary.org/ for more information.
