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Terrific Touring Tidewater



By Jim Elliott (Photos by Jim Elliott) attended the 1980 Indianapolis 500 watching from the roof of my 1976 Chevy Van in Turn 3 of the infield. The pre-race parade featured 100 gleaming white Trans Am pace car replicas. I remember thinking that it sure would be neat to eventually own one of those Trans Ams.

Eventually came a year and a half later when I happened upon one at Ward Pontiac in Newport News. The Trans Am wasn't in great shape having been driven over 50,000 miles and now surrendered on repossession. To me, it didn't matter as it was my chance to acquire a pace car. After some creative financing, the Trans Am was mine.

After driving it a few years, the luster had worn off and I began to seriously consider selling it to acquire the 1978 Corvette Pace Car. In 1999, Hurricane Floyd made my decision for me as the Trans Am was submerged in the hurricane flooding and declared a total loss. I eventually sold it to another pace car admirer in Indianapolis.

I never quite got the Trans Am totally out of my mind and regretted its loss. While browsing the internet, I located another 1980 pace car at a dealership in New York. I have found that the internet has a goal of keeping my savings account depleted. After exchanging pictures and phone calls, the dealer and I agreed on a price and my new 1980 Trans Am pace car was on its way. This new pace car was in much better shape than the first. It even had the power antenna option which the first lacked. I quickly began to make the car "perfect" and knew one day it could be an acceptable "Show car".

Its debut was the AACA National meet in Roanoke in 2005. By winning its First Junior Award, it became the first car built in the 1980's to receive an AACA award. I've shown it many times since achieving its Senior in Hershey, a First Grand National in Dover; a Senior Grand National in Kalamazoo, and a repeat Senior Grand National in Topeka. The Trans Am features the only American made production turbocharged V-8 engine. The engine produces 210 horsepower from a 301 cubic inch engine, and all of the 5,600 Pace cars were equipped with automatic transmission, four wheel disc brakes and aluminum air flow wheels.

When the Bristol meet was announced, I had planned on taking a different car until I learned that track laps would be offered. The choice to take the Trans Am became easy. Ten laps at 70 miles per hour at 39 degree banking was quite a thrill.



The interior has embroidered Trans Am logos on the door panels and rear seat.



Top speed is 116 MPH with acceleration of zero to 60 in 8.2 seconds. The only modification made to the Trans Am that paced the Indy 500 was the removal of the air conditioning system. This was the only Pontiac chosen to pace the Indy 500 and Daytona 500 in the same year and the only pace car ever featured on the cover of the Indy 500 Program (If you look closely, you will see that my copy is autographed by the 1980 winner, Johnny Rutherford).



I was surprised to receive a National Award nomination for the Trans Am and was humbled to be named the winner. For obvious reasons, the Bristol show will always be my favorite. While I was judging, my wife Donna and daughter Kristin sat with the Trans Am at Bristol. I wonder if the judges would have noticed it if I had attended the show alone.







A fter high school graduation in 1963, I chafed at the restrictions my Dad placed on my use of the family's second car, a '59 Pontiac Catalina convertible, especially since I had stuffed it into a telephone pole not far from our house on 34th Street in Washington, D.C.

I still had a small stock portfolio which he had helped me build and I was entering Georgetown University as a freshman in the Fall. Alas, I had stocks, a scholarship, football practice on the horizon but no car. So, being a bright young man, I sold all but a few of the stocks and went on a hunt for my own very first car. There was no internet, only the classifieds, and I knew that I couldn't go to the Delaware and Maryland beaches that summer before entering college in anything other than a convertible, a Chevy convertible.

The power pack 265 and Powerglide trans called out to be replaced, but that would come later. Nervously I took the keys from the older gentleman selling it. As he took my money, I thought of all the things I had to do to get it ready for its maiden trip - from the nation's capitol to Leavenworth. Kansas. my mother's hometown. She and my grandmother were flying out Friday to prepare my grandmother's house in Leavenworth for its sale. They needed me to be their muscle and their transportation and they wanted me there when they arrived.

The trooper told me brusquely that open pipes are for the race track, not the highway, and he'd watch while I replaced the caps. Once out of Indiana, those caps were once again back in the trunk and I was in 7th heaven. Took me twenty-three hours of reveling in the sound of open pipes to roll into the town where my mother had grown up, and 24 hours of sleep to recover. That car eventually ended up an NHRA G/Stocker, 3 speed, 2-4 barrel blueprinted .030 over engine. I sold it to a fellow student at the university to buy a '57 convertible, but that's another whole story.

GREAT NEWS about vintage YOM license plates

Hello, members of TRAACA,

I spent a couple of hours at DMV (you know the drill) processing the title transfer and registering of my recently purchased 1925 Model T Depot Hack. I had been lucky to find a nice set of 'YOM' (year of manufacture) license plates on eBay. When the clerk at DMV searched the DMV system about the plates, it was revealed that they were still owned by someone (she said in Charlottesville). While this could be possible, it is not probable. In no way do I believe that the eBay seller knew this.

NOTE FROM BOB STEIN

There are a couple of issues here - it is most likely that the plates were used in recent years for the same purpose as Mr. Adams had - registration of an antique vehicle. While DMV does not HAVE records going back before the 1970s, they do maintain recent records and antique plates are permanent. The likely scenario is that the person who used them before sold the car, kept the plates, and never told DMV he had sold the car. Since there are no taxes involved, DMV might never check. I had an antique plate from a car I had owned ten years prior get a parking ticket in Alexandria, VA. I had even notified DMV of the sale, but I was still the last registered owner on file so I was sent the ticket. Easy to get out of, but that's how things work.

There is nothing for Legislature to do here - it's the responsibility of the person using the Antique Plate to notify DMV when they are no longer using them. I had Eleanor (the blue TC's) 1948 plate transferred with a letter from the owner.

I just got a call (and in fact a second backup call) from DMV. They said that they had received the letter that I had sent to our Virginia Beach State Senator Wagner. The lady said there was no reason why I couldn't put the YOM plates on my 1925 Depot Hack <u>and</u> that DMV was sending me a note about it and will send me a registration card to cover it.

I didn't mean to be a squeaky wheel, but it never hurts to speak up. Thanks to those who contacted me with their discussions and thoughts and experiences. If you have had the problem, print this email and head out to your DMV again. Ask them to be sure to issue you a registration card. You may have to ask for the supervisor. I don't know where the call came from (local or Richmond). If you anticipate trying again, for ammunition, I will reveal the persons name if you will email me, Gene Adams in Virginia Beach (see roster)

PS. There may be legitimate reasons why you can't use a plate. You can't win them all!
