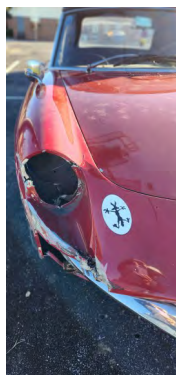

Veterans Spotlight

Master Gunnery Sergeant (MGySgt) Herbert H. Mumford, Jr.

I enlisted in the Marine Corps in 1974 and underwent Recruit Training at Parris Island, SC, followed by Basic Infantry Training at Camp Lejeune, NC. After graduating, I was meritoriously promoted to Private First Class.

My first assignment was with 2nd Marine Division as an Infantry Fire Team Leader. Two years later, in 1976, came my first deployment, to the Mediterranean Sea. Following that, and another promotion, I became a Drill Instructor at Marine Corps Recruit Depot, San Diego.

My career then became more focused around Logistics Support and in 1980 I became a Basic Logistics Clerk. This led to several follow-on assignments as Embarkation Chief, responsible for the movement of personnel and supplies to ensure expeditious deployment of the unit. My first assignment as Embarkation Chief was with the 22 Marine Amphibious Unit (MAU, which is now currently known as Marine Expeditionary Unit or MEU). I completed two deployments with them, first to the Multi Nation Peace Keeping Force, Beirut, Lebanon, then to Urgent Fury, the invasion of Grenada. After this, I was transferred to Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point—again as Embarkation Chief for 2nd Marine Air Wing.

One year later, my orders came for an assignment to USS Guadalcanal as the Combat Cargo Assistant. During this tour, the USS Guadalcanal conducted Mine Counter Measure Operations in the Persian Gulf. Two more assignments as Combat Cargo Assistant followed this.

In 1996, I was promoted to the rank of Master Gunnery Sergeant and this led to significant senior-level assignments:

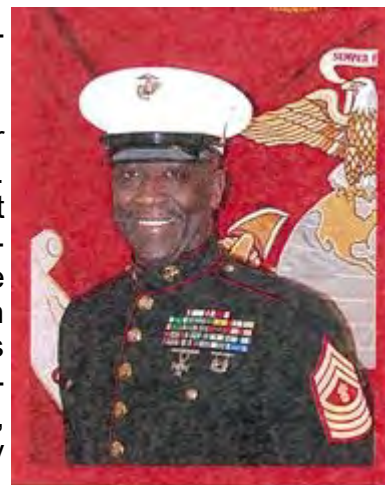
-Command Senior Enlisted Advisor at US Support Group Haiti

-G4 Logistics Chief at Commander Marine Corps Forces Atlantic in Norfolk, and

-Force Combat Cargo Assistant/Marine Senior Enlisted Advisor with Commander, Naval Sur-

face Force, US Atlantic Fleet.

I finally retired after 30 years of service. Along the way, I met and married my lovely wife, Deborah. We were blessed with four daughters (Donna, Shirelle, Kisha, and Tomkia), one son (Gunnery Sergeant Herbert H. Mumford, III), and five grandchildren.



My love of cars started early. In high school, I drove a 1964 Chevy Impala SS 327 automatic in the floor with the console. My next car was a 1977 C-3 Corvette, and from then on, I bought, enjoyed, and sold numerous Corvettes, although I also had a 1969 Camaro at some point. Some of the Corvettes I had throughout the years included:

- C-2 Corvettes: 1966 Laguna Blue convertible; 1966 427/390hp Silver Pearl; 1967 427 w/400 tri-power hp Rally Red convertible; 1967 427/435 tri-power hp coupe with side pipes (Oh, I really missed it! That is the one that slipped away...a fully documented car).
- C-3 Corvettes: 1977 4-speed; 1979 and 1981.
- C-4 Corvettes: 1984 and 1988 coupes.
- C-5 Corvettes: 2002 convertible.
- C-6 Corvettes: 2008 ZO6.

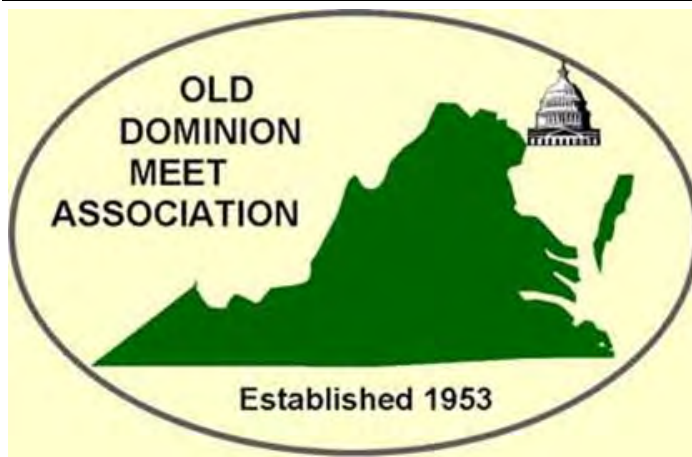

MARK YOUR CALENDAR NOW! - Tidewater Region will host the 2026 Old Dominion Meet on Saturday, May 2nd 2026 at the site of the Real Life Church on Centerville Turnpike in Chesapeake, Va.

What is the Old Dominion Meet Association? - and all you wanted to know about this prestigious event -

The Old Dominion Meet Association (ODMA) is one of the few non-geographical associations of its kind in AACA. Many of the AACA regions within the commonwealth of Virginia are members of this long-standing group. Tidewater Region and its members have long been involved in this organization and have held many leadership positions in the organization.

The Old Dominion Meet Association was formed in the 1950s by an early group of AACA members led by past AACA National President Edgar Rhor in Manassas, Virginia. The non-governing organization was intended to hold AACA Regions and Chapters together under one banner that could deal with automobile legislative issues related to antique vehicle registration and usage. A big part of their long-standing goals was to host an annual event for all AACA members in Virginia.

Through the combined efforts and resources of member organizations, many outstanding events have been held throughout the state on a rotating basis. Many of them have been formatted similar to our AACA National Meets and serve as an opportunity for members to experience the kind of events unique to AACA. It has also been an excellent chance to expose newer members to the AACA style of judging. Awards given by the Old Dominion Meet Association are patterned after AACA National Awards.

The Old Dominion Meet Association radiator badge, as illustrated here, is proudly displayed on First Junior and Senior vehicles and can only be received at these events.

ODMA continues to host a statewide meet each year which rotates among the regions around the commonwealth. The class structure organization, judging criteria and awards follow those of AACA with some local exceptions. Many of you were able to attend last year's great event at the Keystone Tractor and Truck Museum near Petersburg.

There are several special awards given each year -

The **"Old Dominion Trophy"** is presented to the region with the most member participation points earned as selected from a large number of categories (most judges participating, most vehicles on the show field, longest distance driven, and points for each individual vehicle award, etc). The Tidewater Region has been the recipient of this unique award many times previously.

The **"Walser & Edgar Rohr Trophy"** is awarded to the region with the largest percentage of members participating in the meet, regardless of region size.

These awards are designed to encourage participation by members of participating AACA Regions. The awards themselves are on display in the Virginia Transportation Museum in Roanoke, Virginia.

The **"Best in Show"** trophy is awarded to the very best vehicle on the show field, as selected by the vehicle judging class Team Captains, the meet's Chief Judge, and the Chief Judge's assistants.

TIDEWATER REGION is proud to take their turn hosting this great and historic event in 2026. STILL COLLECTING - Looking ahead, through your GOGGLES

Did you know there was a time when a new car was so "basic" it came without a top, headlamps or even a windshield? Yes, many very early cars were wide-open. Of course they didn't go fast enough that you needed to worry about bugs between our teeth!


But, roads were unpaved and, when they were not too muddy to drive on, dust was an issue.

Various add-ons for early cars included tops, side-screens, and some kind of windshield. It

took them a while to catch on. People were afraid of all that simple window glass between them and whatever they might run into. Yes, early windshields used regular window glass! They were simple, wood framed single pane glass mounted onto the dashboard.

The need for eye protection quickly became obvious. A pair of goggles was the answer. They were adapted from cyclists and horse-drawn vehicle drivers. They were handy and came in whatever styles or variations best met the motorist's needs. The earliest goggles were often incorporated into full or partial face coverings.

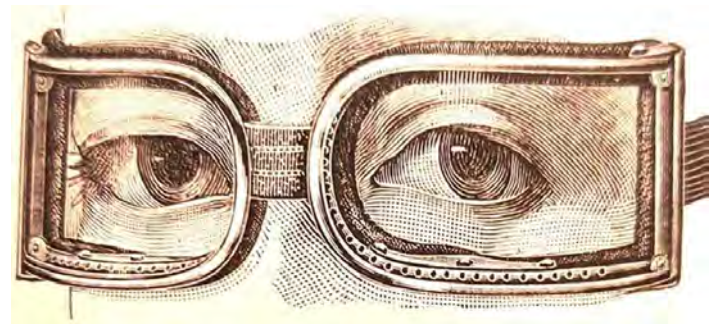

In 1871, Thomas A. Willson & Co. opened its factory doors on 2nd & Washington Streets in downtown Reading, PA. Founded by Gile J. Willson and Dr. Thomas A. Willson, it was the first company in the United States to manufacture optical lenses. In 1876, Thomas A. Willson patented the process for hardening glass, enabling the production of shatterproof protective eyeglasses. With the rising popularity of early aviation and motoring, protective eye-wear quickly became one of their most popular products. Among the company's bestsellers at this time were Arundel tinted lenses. By the 1930s they were producing a variety of protective eye-wear including swimming goggles. In 1980, due to the Occupational Safety & Health Act (OSHA), Willson stopped manufacturing safety eyewear to focus its attention on developing new varieties of respirators, gloves, and other protective equipment. By 2002 the company had closed and their factory, known as "Goggleworks" remained vacant until 2005, when it was revised into "Googleworks Center For the Arts".

Driving goggles are still being manufactured today and remain popular with motorcycle drivers and old car enthusiasts who like to dress appropriately. They are fairly inexpensive and fun to collect for the many varieties that can be found. When I think of goggles, the tune to the 1970's Johnny Nash song "I Can See Clearly Now" always comes to mind.

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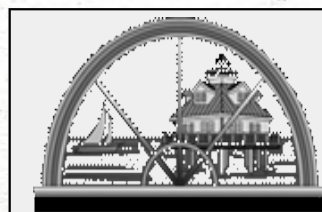
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
